Starting in the 2004 budget, Turkey's system was transformed, and the 'programs' shown in previous budgets have been removed. However, beginning in 2007, performance-based budgeting, which links strategic plans with programs, will be implemented on a pilot basis.

We have provided below a hypothetical example to illustrate to the reader the change that has occurred in the budget presentation.

Peer Reviewer ONE Comment: A more appropriate response to this question would be "c." Please note that for the 2005 budget year, only the pre-budget statement, the *Macroeconomic Framework*, prepared by the State Planning Organization and approved by the High Planning Council was produced.

The researcher cites the medium-term budget framework, entitled the *Medium-Term Fiscal Plan*, which was issued by the Ministry of Finance in June 2005. However, this document covered the period 2006-2008 and was not a supporting document for the executive's 2005 budget proposal.

IBP Comment: Turkey (as well as some other countries included in this survey) maintains the practice of releasing documents containing information on year-end performance in documents concurrent with the presentation of the executive's budget proposal. Therefore, year-end reporting in Turkey occurs 10 months or more after the end of the budget year. This practice is inconsistent with the OECD Best Practices on Budget Transparency, which requires that a year-end report be issued six months or less after the end of the budget year.

However, they issue a statement of conformity to the parliament that the use of appropriations stated in the Final Accounts Bill prepared by the Ministry of Finance are in line with the accounts of the state accountants given to the TCA. We view the appropriate response as “c” because the general statement of conformity does not cover all actual outcomes.
